1. Josh is not allowed to attend school in Finland because his parents are illegal immigrants.	Article 1 All human beings are born free and equal in dignity and rights. They are endowed with reason and conscience and should act towards one another in a spirit of brotherhood.
2. Khaled was born in Finland and he has graduated from a university of applied sciences. He has applied for dozens of jobs without any success. He has phoned employers about vacancies but as soon as they have heard his name, they have lost interest.	Article 2 Everyone is entitled to all the rights and freedoms set forth in this Declaration, without distinction of any kind, such as race, colour, sex, language, religion, political or other opinion, national or social origin, property, birth or other status. Furthermore, no distinction shall be made on the basis of the political, jurisdictional or international status of the country or territory to which a person belongs, whether it be independent, trust, non-self-governing or under any other limitation of sovereignty.
3. Kelly believes that it is her human right to participate in a school strike for a climate event.	Article 3 Everyone has the right to life, liberty and security of person.
4. Anong met a Finnish man in Thailand. He invited Anong to Finland to live with him. When in Finland, Anong worked 12 hours every day without a day off and without any wages.	Article 4 No one shall be held in slavery or servitude; slavery and the slave trade shall be prohibited in all their forms.
5. RED SQUARE The teacher does not allow you to attend a climate strike. Go back two squares.	
6. Chephas and Alex are incessantly talking while the teacher is lecturing. The teacher has asked them to be quiet, but they continue talking, so the teacher asks them to leave the classroom.	Article 5 No one shall be subjected to torture or to cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment.
7. The police suspect that Jaakko is carrying drugs. He is detained without formal charges being made against him. He is kept in a holding cell for the weekend. He is not allowed to call anyone.	Article 6 Everyone has the right to recognition everywhere as a person before the law.

The school is holding his guardians responsible for cleaning and repainting the wall.</p>	<p>Article 7 All are equal before the law and are entitled without any discrimination to equal protection of the law. All are entitled to equal protection against any discrimination in violation of this Declaration and against any incitement to such discrimination.</p>
<p>9. Igor came to Finland to work for a construction company. When his visa expired, the employer stopped paying his wages and his working hours were lengthened. After four months the employer accused Igor of stealing building materials. The police refused to investigate the case when Igor reported human trafficking. Instead he was arrested for theft.</p>	<p>Article 8 Everyone has the right to an effective remedy by the competent national tribunals for acts violating the fundamental rights granted him by the constitution or by law.</p>

<p>11. Two members of the musical group Pussy Riot who have expressed their support for Alexei Navalny have been placed under house arrest in Russia.</p>	<p>Article 9 No one shall be subjected to arbitrary arrest, detention or exile.</p>
<p>12. An asylum-seeker reported human trafficking after he had worked 12-hour days in a restaurant for three months without any wages. The police closed the investigation and stated that the case was just a private disagreement between an employer and an employee.</p>	<p>Article 10 Everyone is entitled in full equality to a fair and public hearing by an independent and impartial tribunal, in the determination of his rights and obligations and of any criminal charge against him.</p>
<p>13. Ziming has been charged with committing a penal offence. He does not speak Finnish and is not able to understand the charge, but the police say that they have no obligation to provide him with an interpreter.</p>	<p>Article 11</p> <p>1. Everyone charged with a penal offence has the right to be presumed innocent until proven guilty according to law in a public trial at which he has had all the guarantees necessary for his defence.</p> <p>2. No one shall be held guilty of any penal offence on account of any act or omission which did not constitute a penal offence, under national or international law, at the time when it was committed. Nor shall a heavier penalty be imposed than the one</p>

	that was applicable at the time the penal offence was committed.
14. 16-year-old Ritva lives in a small town. She refused to date a boy of the same age. Offended, the boy spread a rumour that she had slept with him. Other students in the same school continued spreading false stories about Ritva on social media.	Article 12 No one shall be subjected to arbitrary interference with his privacy, family, home or correspondence, nor to attacks upon his honour and reputation. Everyone has the right to the protection of the law against such interference or attacks.

16. Some people believe that ISIS wives should not have been allowed to return to Finland.	Article 13 1. Everyone has the right to freedom of movement and residence within the borders of each state. 2. Everyone has the right to leave any country, including his own, and to return to his country.
17. Hamid is seeking asylum in Finland after fleeing military service in his home country. He fears his sexual orientation might expose him to persecution in his own country, where homosexuality is illegal.	Article 14 1. Everyone has the right to seek and to enjoy in other countries asylum from persecution. 2. This right may not be invoked in the case of prosecutions genuinely arising from non-political crimes or from acts contrary to the purposes and principles of the United Nations.
18. Marcelline moved from British-India to Rhodesia. She was required to give up her British-Indian citizenship to get Rhodesian citizenship. When Rhodesia later became Zimbabwe in 1980, the Zimbabwean government decided that anyone who had not been born in the country did not have any right to Zimbabwean citizenship. Therefore, Marcelline was left stateless.	Article 15 1. Everyone has the right to a nationality. 2. No one shall be arbitrarily deprived of his nationality nor denied the right to change his nationality
19. Faizah was forced to marry a 30-year-old man at the age of 14, and she	Article 16

Men and women of full age, without any limitation due to race, nationality or religion, have the right to marry and to found a family. They are entitled to equal rights as to marriage, during marriage and at its dissolution. 2. Marriage shall be entered into only with the free and full consent of the intending spouses. 3. The family is the natural and fundamental group unit of society and is entitled to protection by society and the State.

Helmi has made derogatory comments about a gay classmate.</p>	<p>Article 19</p> <p>Everyone has the right to freedom of opinion and expression; this right includes freedom to hold opinions without interference and to seek, receive and impart information and ideas through any media and regardless of frontiers.</p>
<p>24. Pekka wants to leave the biker gang he joined at a young age, but he fears for his life.</p>	<p>Article 20</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Everyone has the right to freedom of peaceful assembly and association. 2. No one may be compelled to belong to an association.
<p>25. RED SQUARE You vote for a municipal candidate who has committed a hate crime. Wait for a new election for one turn.</p>	

<p>26. Ida believes that no one with a criminal record should be allowed to run for municipal elections.</p>	<p>Article 21 1. Everyone has the right to take part in the government of his country, directly or through freely chosen representatives. 2. Everyone has the right of equal access to public service in his country. 3. The will of the people shall be the basis of the authority of government; this will shall be expressed in periodic and genuine elections which shall be by universal and equal suffrage and shall be held by secret vote or by equivalent free voting procedures.</p>

Everyone has the right to work, to free choice of employment, to just and favourable conditions of work and to protection against unemployment. 2. Everyone, without any discrimination, has the right to equal pay for equal work. 3. Everyone who works has the right to just and favourable remuneration ensuring for himself and his family an existence worthy of human dignity, and supplemented, if necessary, by other means of social protection. 4. Everyone has the right to form and to join trade unions for the protection of his interests.</p>

Everyone has the right to a standard of living adequate for the health and well-being of himself and of his family, including food, clothing, housing and medical care and necessary social services, and the right to security in the event of unemployment, sickness, disability, widowhood, old age or other lack of livelihood in circumstances beyond his control.</p> <p>2. Motherhood and childhood are entitled to special care and assistance. All children, whether born in or out of wedlock, shall enjoy the same social protection.</p>
<p>32. Jaakko's parents have decided to homeschool him for religious reasons, but he would like to attend normal school.</p>	<p>Article 26</p> <p>1. Everyone has the right to education. Education shall be free, at least in the elementary and fundamental stages. Elementary education shall be compulsory. Education shall be directed to the full development of the human personality and to the strengthening of respect for human rights and fundamental freedoms. Everyone has duties to the community in which alone the free and full development of his personality is possible. 2. In the exercise of his rights and freedoms, everyone shall be subject only to such limitations as are determined by law solely for the purpose of securing due recognition and respect for the rights and freedoms of others and of meeting the just requirements of morality, public order and the general welfare in a democratic society. 3. These rights and freedoms may in no case be exercised contrary to the purposes and principles of the United Nations.
<p>35. Over 20,000 people have lost their lives trying to cross the Mediterranean in search of safety or better life since 2014. Many of them have been shipwrecked in unsafe boats or their boats have been turned back to sea by European or Libyan coastal guards.</p>	<p>Article 30</p> <p>Nothing in this Declaration may be interpreted as implying for any State, group or person any right to engage in any activity or to perform any act aimed at the destruction of any of the rights and freedoms set forth herein.</p>
